Out 'n About for Lunch | Continuing a Legacy







Pastor Bob will conclude this journey of the 66 books of the Bible at the end of June. This study will be on hiatus through the summer and return in the Fall.




would set her up for a trip to the Olympic trials in June – and potentially the 2024 Summer games.

Recent Projects FHPC Missions Funded To Share God's Love

Church in Sierra Leone

Pastor Simmons asked the Missions Committee to support a church that had been destroyed in Sierra Leone. The pastor of this church is Reverend Edmond Howard, who describes Pastor Bob as the "strong bone" behind him and a father to his family. The Mission Committee voted to give \$500 from our budget to support the rebuilding of this church. Pray for this church as they struggle to rebuild.

Community House



At our May Mission Committee meeting, Lila Kirsh presented information about Community House and the needs that FHPC might want to support.

On Mondays, dinner is served by various churches and organizations to about 80-90 people at 5PM. Churches can bring the food and volunteers will serve it or they can stay to serve and talk with the guests. The meal provided consists of an entree, rice or potato dish, bread, salad, and dessert. Community House provides the plates, etc., and setup. There is a kitchen with 3 stoves to heat food up.

The Mission committee voted to donate \$325 monthly to get food for the 3rd Monday in June, July, and August. Members will talk to other church people to see

if we can get a group together to bring the food to Community House and help serve. Matha Carillo has agreed to head up the first dinner on June 17th.

Code Red

Code:Red Water Drive sponsored by Phoenix Rescue Mission will run through the end of July. Their goal is

to send out 1,000,000 water bottles this summer.

Last summer 645 lives were lost due to the extreme heat which is 52% over the year before. Lives are at risk



this summer! No one is in more danger than our homeless neighbors. Together we can help save lives.



Looking Back 50 Years | Jackie Miles

In going through some Sunday worship programs and monthly newsletters that are in our archives, I came across some things I would like to share with you as we celebrate our 50th year of existence.

Dorothy Parris, our pianist, was the founding musician of our congregation beginning in 1979, with Rev. Glenn Atchinson. Raised in Haskell, Oklahoma, she began piano lessons at age 6. When she later moved to Tulsa, she played for Sunday school and church services, and performed for hospital and service clubs.

Debbie Fisher started working with kids and singing in the choir in 1991. She was hired by Rev. Atchinson in 1993.

December 1974, there were 62 charter members of our church. By 1**992** there were 493 members.

The 1992 Financial Plan, "Can Do!" in which the distribution of the funds was divided into 8 parts: Administration, Debt Service, Worship, Education, Pastoral Care, Evangelism, Missions, and Facilities. The goal was \$324,963, to be raised through pledges (\$250,000) and other sources within the congregation.

The "Can Do" Challenge for 1992 had four objectives:

- 1. Attract new persons through Worship, Education, Fellowship, and Service.
- 2. Increase programs for small children and older adults.
- 3. Maintain high quality of staff, Clergy and volunteers.
- 4. Maintain excellence in the beautiful campus.

Ken Martinson, a along-time member of FHPC first served as a Deacon in 1990. Musician Jeff Dayton, a resident of Fountain Hills at that time, was a soloist on December 16, 1990. Also that year, our church hosted a Choir Fest in November. Participating choirs were from FHPC, Rio Verde Community Church, Congregational Church of the Valley, and the Lutheran Church, and it was emceed by Bill Quigley. At the end, Pastor Glenn's wife, Joan Atchinson, directed all the choirs together as they sang Handel's Hallelujah Chorus.

The **Columbarium** waterfall was dedicated on November 11, 1990.

In 1991 a service, **Prayer for Peace in the Middle East,** was held on Sunday, January 13. **AA** was meeting weekly in the conference room, and we had a dedication of our new **Steinway piano** on Sunday, April 28, 1991.

On February 16, 1992, Pastor Glenn bade farewell to our **Associate Pastor Steve Frazier**, who was on his way to Africa, and **Leonard Engstrom** was his replacement. In 1992 we were entertained by our men's instrumental group called **The Retreads**. On May 24, 1992, the **Biblical Garden**, surrounding the Columbarium was dedicated. The garden was a gift to our church by **Roy Wulfmeier** in memory of his wife, Helen Wulfmeier (1920-1991).

When Pastor Glenn retired in 1999, Gary Kush became our interim pastor, assisted by Stan Jones. At that time Barb Wyman was choir director, Caryl Bates was organist, and Dorothy Parris was the pianist. We were blessed with a brass Quartet thanks to Al Roselieb, Roy Nickel, Roger Shepherd, and Bill Covault. Emily Young frequently played the flute.

On January 29, 1999, FHPC hosted the **FH** Community Choral Fest, where each choir sang 1 or 2 songs and then all joined together at the end in Handel's Hallelujah Chorus. Participating choirs were from the FHPC, Rio Verde Community Church, Congregational Church of the Valley, Ft. McDowell Presbyterian Church, CG's of St. Anthony's, Christ's Church, Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church, and the FH Community Chorus.

Donna Hansen led our Hiking Group. Jim and Becky Witherspoon put together our Yellow Pages (a list of members who had gifts or talents they were willing to share to help other church members). Bill Quigley was chef for the October 17 Pig Roast. And we collected cans of soup for Souper Bowl Sunday.

In 2002, **Ewen Holmes** was our pastor, assisted by associate pastor **Benjamin Keller**. In February, Session established a fund for the purchase of hand bells (the cost was \$180.00 each).

Helen Quigley was Clerk of Session, Barb Wyman celebrated her retirement as choir director after 17 years, and Al Roselieb was named her replacement. The church's January utility bill was published (electricity \$787.00, phone \$323.57, water & sewer \$14.55, trash \$122.24, and pest control \$40.00.) And most importantly, plans were begun for the building of the Fellowship Center. Ben Fast was chair of this project. I'll wind up this article with items from 2003. Mary Alice Bivens served as Clerk of Session. We bought a new computer and developed a fully functional

website (www.fhpresbyterian.org), developed a "tape ministry" where a tape of the Sunday service, and a tape recorder if needed, were taken to those unable to attend church because of poor health. The Deacons and Men's Group also provided

transportation, when needed, to church and to medical appointments.

In May, **Marta Ludwig** became the new administrative coordinator. An All Church Rummage Sale was held Sat. Oct. 25 from 7a.m. to 2 p.m. to help pay for the new Fellowship Center. Sales netted \$12,000 and **Jean Ipema** was very involved with this. Sept. 21 saw the Groundbreaking Ceremony for Fellowship Hall, and costs for this project were published, only to be revised again and again. But this was a very important project when you realize that up to this point, there was no church kitchen or large area for fellowship activities (other than outside).

Portrait of Jesus | Jackie Miles

The Fountain Hills Presbyterian Church, now celebrating its 50th year, has a portrait of Jesus of Nazareth on Arizona flagstone adorning the front

wall of its sanctuary.



A gift from the Prescott artist, Earl MacPherson in 1976, it was his 97th "Christone", using techniques that go back 200 centuries in the history of art. All with the same interpretation of Christ, many of these portraits are exhibited in churches in Arizona and California.

In 1967, Rev. Conrad Braaten

of Ascension Lutheran Church in Scottsdale

commissioned MacPherson to paint a portrait of Christ. The artist began to study and reflect, and developed his interpretation of Jesus, which included reddish hair and blue eyes. This supported a description of Christ by a clerk in Pontious Pilate's court in the Archeko Volumes, and a description in the Dead Sea Scrolls.

The artist said he wanted to use something of the earth, so he chose Arizona flagstone, which comes out in layers and has a smooth surface. The technique of painting on stone goes back to cave paintings, where artists used charcoal from their fires.

MacPherson used charcoal, as well as Italian crayon and Conte crayon – permanent colors that he rubbed into the stone with his fingers.

Our Church's Miracle | Beverly Mills

On Sunday, June 2, 2024, Beverly Mills returned as a featured soloist to sing "Goodness of God," took me home to care for me themselves. My home became Beverly's Bootcamp where I was taken through rigorous therapy at home and eventually was months in this personal testimony.

This song is a testimony of God's goodness and grace. On September 2, 2022, I found myself face



down in the parking lot outside. I have no recollection of what happened leading up to the fall, but I got up with a large blood filled bruise over the right side of my

forehead. I called my daughter and she and my son-in -law came to get me. I have no recollections of the ensuing 6 months after the fall. I was told that I was rushed into surgery because of a severe bleed inside my brain. I was given a 50% chance of survival.

Due to God's grace, I made it through surgery but that was the easy part. For the next 3 months, I was unconscious and oblivious to the world around me. I was in the ICU on a ventilator for weeks, followed by a tracheostomy and a feeding tube. My eyes opened for less than 1 hour a day, but I had no idea where I was or what was happening.

I spent the next 3 months in 3 hospitals until they said there was nothing more they could do for me. I could not move except for some minor movements in my left arm. My body was immobilized and I was dependent on 24/7 care. I could do nothing for myself.

Against the advice of the social worker, my family took me home to care for me themselves. My home became Beverly's Bootcamp where I was taken through rigorous therapy at home and eventually was able to go to outpatient rehab. I still could not move or do anything for myself. I relied on a lift that transported me from one room to the next around the house. I called it "the contraption" and I hated that thing. I spent the next several months in a fog, not fully aware of what was happening or what had happened.

Through the loving care of my family and God's Grace, I am here to sing this song. I will be eternally grateful to Debbie Fisher and Dorothy Parris who have been instrumental in getting me close to my preaccident soprano voice. Debbie encouraged me to continue to be part of the choir even though I could not carry a note. My voice would not hold the soprano notes. Dorothy was incredibly patient while we practiced and never seemed bothered by my slow progress.

Many thanks also to Susan Harding who was happy to take me to choir practice every Thursday. Many thanks to Pastor Bob and my church family who prayed and supported me through these most difficult times. You have lovingly called me the "Church's Miracle" and "Hop along Beverly." I love all of you dearly; I pray God's Blessing on you all.

There was something magical about going to Grandma's house in Simcoe, Ontario. It was more than her little wire fenced garden that was lined with hollyhocks. On the side of the wire fence was a quaint little walkway that led to the massive front porch, a square wrought iron sign read 'Conservatory of Music'.

The house was yellow, two story and had white trim. The massive entryway door had the most ornate doorbell in the center of it. Turn the key and it would ring the silliest ring for such a magnificent door, I giggled and rang it continuously until Grandma showed up hushing me into silence until we were upstairs. Grandma lived on the upper floor, downstairs from her place was where the Bartholimue sisters lived. The sisters were piano teachers. Before I was hurried up the stairs, I woulde peer beyond the entryway where I could see beyond the glass panes on the French doors that secluded the rooms where the lesson pianos were. Upstairs, I was mesmerized by the music notes that seemed to float out of the rooms up to my ears and beyond. I would imagine the thrill of being able to play the piano so beautifully.

My piano skills were far below what I heard coming from the conservatory. I imagined what it would be like to play music that sounded like that. It wasn't until I attended boarding school in Whillouby, Ohio that my piano skills began to sound like music. In a room quite like one of the rooms at my grandmother's house, I would sit at the piano to play my assignments for the instructor. He would tap his baton for rhythm as opposed to using a metronome. Studying was sometimes grueling, but I was determined. I loved classical piano. My first goal was to play Fur Elise, a Ludwig Beethoven classic. I moved on to Sonatas and learned

Sonata by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart; still my favorite piece to play today. When I could finally play Moonlight Sonata, my dreams of long ago were becoming a reality. Whenever I flew home for family visits, I would sit at the piano and pound the keyboard to play as loudly as I could. Maybe my playing wasn't as welcome as I thought it should be, I determined that from my father knocking loudly on the wall between us.

While in boarding school, I also joined the chorus. Tryouts made me a nervous wreck, but once I was accepted, I enjoyed every harmonious moment of our "glee club", although I don't think at an all girls boarding school it was really a typical glee club.

I found that I enjoyed entertaining. Learning music to Peter and the Wolf, I did some stints of Story Telling while babysitting during the summer months. I studied piano for twelve years.

Perhaps my interest in music stemmed from family. My mother was a piano player. She always hoped for a classical piano player. Each child I brought into this world, she scrutinized their hands and finger length and dreamed that one day she would have a famous classical piano player. Her father was a band leader in Hamilton, Ontario.

My father's mother's parents sent my grandmother off to make a living by playing the piano. She played at different pubs in London. A scout from Saskatchewan heard of her and sent for her to join him. On the way to Canada, she and her driver fell in love and instead she married him. Eventually they opened their own pub.

Today, I enjoy being in the choir for FHPC. Debbie Fisher has an amazing way of bringing out my voice. Dorothy Parris is an amazing piano player. I could not ask for a better group of choir members either. *Nancy Grahlmann*
