
LIVE IN THE PRESENT:






Thank You for Joining Us: Continuing the Spirit of Unity


Bible Study | Rev. Dr. Bob Simmons

Are You Connected?



Library Footnotes

Book Review | Donna Yordy

The Teacher of Warsaw by Mario Escobar



I have read many books about the war but "The Teacher of Warsaw" was the first book I had read concerning the Jewish children that lived in the orphanage in Warsaw. The teacher, Janusz Korczak, was a real person and the facts in the book are true.

Janusz Korczak was Jewish. He had a medical degree and worked at the

Children's Hospital in Warsaw. He later founded and was the head of the Jewish orphanage. He was considered Poland's greatest teacher and was known and loved by many.

In 1940 the Germans had all of the Jewish people, including the children in the orphanage, move into the ghetto. Janusz was devoted to the children and as conditions worsened he found food for them and even tried to help some of them escape. He made sure that each day the children lived as normal a life as was possible.

Janusz was concerned about the children and the



conditions they were having to live in. At some point during this time he, along with the children, adopted a set of laws that acknowledged the rights of children. His set of laws was

later recognized and inspired the Declaration of the Rights of the Child which was adopted by the United Nations in 1959.

Janusz kept a manuscript of what was happening and he hid it in the orphanage before everyone was deported in 1942. He told several of the teachers where the manuscript was hidden and after the war one of the teachers had escaped and survived. This teacher went back and retrieved the manuscript from its hiding place and gave it to an editor.

This book touched me deeply. It was about doing the right thing and about caring and being dedicated to the work that you are doing. It is about hope and that good does triumph over evil. It was written for the person who loves truth and dreams of a better world and life.

My piano lessons began prior to first grade in husband's job took precedence. My husband was employed by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, also my second-grade teacher, Wilma Allen, gave me Education. We had assignments on several different



a strong, solid music foundation. I taught myself to play by ear and sight-read during this period.

Following fifth grade, we lived outside Tulsa on an oil lease property prior to and during World War II. We became farmers with all the chores. Gas rationing and other circumstances made further piano lessons impractical.

Bacone College, as it was then known, was the only institution for higher learning strictly for Indian students anywhere in the country. It was fostered by the Northern Baptist Home Mission Society. An orphanage was attached to the school, so the grades included first through two years of junior college. I completed two years of high school and, with a scholarship, two years of junior college. This was a work-study program, and all students were required to work twenty hours a week.

My two years of piano study with June Lillibridge really got me on track! I performed shows at nearby Camp Gruber and with the USO and DAR downtown in Muskogee and Tulsa. The shows included Indian music of the period in tribal dress, and Indian sign language was also incorporated. My two years of junior college were funded by Mrs. James Kraft, wife of the Kraft Cheese guy.

I did one year of piano study with Wilma Belvin. That summer, our girls' trio was asked to do a sixweek promotional tour for the school. This was a road trip through the Midwest with no air conditioning! We performed in small and large churches along the way. I sang and did piano solo numbers. My next teacher was Nina St. John. School programs and piano work continued, but on a lesser scale.

Following graduation, music became a hobby. Marriage, raising a family, and following my

husband's job took precedence. My husband was employed by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Education. We had assignments on several different Indian reservations, and all mission churches needed a piano player, so I was available. There were large gaps of time when I had no piano and no access to one, but I continued to play whenever I could.

In the late '50s, I contracted TB and was hospitalized for 5 1/2 months. This was prior to our assignment in Richfield, Utah.

Richfield proved to be a very busy five-year music period. I accompanied a local women's sextet and performed at many Mormon venues. I also accompanied the Community Chorus for the Messiah and The Creation, even though I had no knowledge of either work at the time.

In 1967, Bowie, Maryland, became our home. We attended the Presbyterian Church there, and I took on the responsibility of music for the early contemporary service. This required total music development from scratch! Music was learned by rote, and I had to learn to play from a lead line. We were required to fill seven music slots each week. At the end of seven years, there were 35-40 singers

had their 50th-year reunion seven years ago, which I was able to attend. We did our regular Sunday service, and many of the original singers were there.

During this time, I became affiliated with the Christian Women's Club and served as resident pianist for the luncheon, plus accompanist for all guest vocalists.

September 2024 marks the beginning of my 45th consecutive season with FHPC. I started in the "Store Front" with Mary Gillespie and Barbara Wyman. When they left, I became the lone musician.

Interestingly, the congregation was singing from song sheets, and a lot of the music was music I had used in Bowie. When we moved to our current location, we had no regular organist or choir director. It was fun to work with fill-in choir directors. Whenever the need arose, we had an organist in the community to fill in for

us. When Caryl Bates arrived, it was fun and a real challenge that required many hours of work each week to develop our piano/organ duet program. I felt it was unique!

I became a charter member of the Arizona Masterworks Chorale in September 1979. It was a great experience singing with an orchestra, nationally and internationally, with big-time orchestras and directors. Skitch Henderson, of the Tonight Show, had formed the NYC Pops Orchestra, and at his request, we did three different performances at Carnegie Hall. I resigned at the beginning of their 2022 season. This marked the beginning of my 43rd consecutive season with AMC.

I was fortunate to have fifteen to eighteen piano students during the '80s and early '90s, who were presented in recitals here in the sanctuary. Several students performed during regular church worship services. It was a great honor to have the Steinway

piano given to the church for me. Many of these students had the opportunity to perform on it.

One A'Chord was a group of six ladies and four men that I performed with. We did an hour-long show at retirement homes and nursing homes valley-wide and

in Prescott. We did Christmas shows and, in the spring, Broadway musical-type shows. At the end of our sixteen-year run, we had done 330 performances.

My work with the Yavapai People of Fort McDowell began in 1984 when I did my first Camp Meeting. Interestingly, my dear friend and fellow tribal

participated in some of the early gatherings. My fellow tribal people have also sung for different occasions.

This brings my church music career full circle in that my first musical memories are of going to sleep in my grandmother's camp house while listening to the Mvskoke people singing in their native language outside the church under the arbor, deep in the woods of Oklahoma. God is good!!

The Power of Prayer




If you are ill or recovering, hospitalized or anticipating a procedure, or going through some difficult times, please let us know so that our church family can raise you in prayer.
